FULTON COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS Monday, November 15, 2021

Meeting Called to Order at 6:00 p.m. with Pledge to the Flag. Present: Bryan Lewis, Rick Ranstead, Steve Metzger, County Attorney Holli Shorter-Pifer and Auditor Christina Sriver

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT – John Geier discussed permit request 21-41. Steve motioned to approve, Rick seconded; carries 3-0. Permit 21-42 was motioned for approval by Rick, Steve seconded; carries 3-0. Permit requests 21-43 and 21-44 are for a proposed business at the corner of Lucas Street and Old US 31 Rick motioned to approve permit request 21-43 for a driveway, Steve seconded; carries 3-0. Rick motioned to approve permit 21-44 for a bore under Old US 31, Steve seconded; carries 3-0. Rick motioned to approve permit request 21-45, Steve seconded; carries 3-0. John updated on the department activities including mowing, picking up leaves. John was awarded a grant for a project on Sweetgum between US 31 and 13th Street. John presented a letter of financial commitment of \$1,182,000 for a total grant of \$5,910,000 for a rehab of Old US 31 N scheduled for 2027.

EMA – Larry Hoover requested a county-issued cell phone for his new employee and mobile app, Commissioner's approve. There is an opportunity to pick-up Clorox wipes from an over-order by another county. They are free with only the cost of travel. Commissioners are dedicating an office in the EMA building to Weights and Measures. Larry will cover the cost of the part needed for the tent the Health Department borrowed for vaccinations.

SHERIFF – Chris Sailors stated Wednesday furniture will begin being moved into the new jail. The key cards have been received for the new jail and will begin to be programmed. He is planning to move the inmates into the new jail in December.

MILEAGE RATE – The Weights and Measures Inspector requested a raise to the mileage rate. An amended resolution will be proposed in the next meeting.

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT FUNDS ("PLAN") – Bryan read the plan for the American Rescue Plan Act, Resolution No. 11152021, aloud:

RESOLUTION NO.	11152021
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A RESOLUTION DESIGNATING AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT FUNDS ("PLAN")

WHEREAS, on May 17, 2021 the Fulton County Board of Commissioners ("Commissioners") did adopt Ordinance No. 05172021: An Ordinance Adopting the ARP Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery fund that established the ARP Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund numbered 8950 to respond to the public health emergency with respect to the COVID-19 for the following purposes as stated in Chapter 531 of the 74th Congress, approved August 14, 1935, 49 Stat. 620 as amended through P.L. 117-2, enacted March 11, 2021:

- 1. To respond to the public health emergency with respect to COVID-19 or its negative economic impacts, including assistance to households, small businesses, and nonprofits, or aid to impacted industries such as tourism, travel, and hospitality;
- 2. To respond to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency by providing premium pay to eligible workers of the State, territory, or Tribal government that are performing



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- 3. such essential work, or y providing grants to eligible employers that have eligible workers who perform essential work;
- 4. For the provision of government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue of such State, territory, or Tribal government due to the COVID-19 public health emergency relative to revenues collected in the most recent full fiscal year of the State, territory, or Tribal government prior to the emergency; or
- 5. To make necessary investments in water, sewer, or broadband infrastructure; and

The U.S. Department of the Treasury ("Treasury") allocated funds to Fulton County in the amount of \$3,879,715.00 be released in two tranches, with fifty percent (50%) received on June 24, 2021, and the balance to be delivered approximately twelve (12) months later; and

WHEREAS, on May 17, 2021, the United States Department of Treasury ("Treasury") issued an Interim Final Rule ("IFR"), to implement the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund and the Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (SLFRF) established under the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act; and

WHEREAS, on June 24, 2021, the Treasury issued the Compliance and Reporting Guidance ("Guidance") to provide information on all SLFRF funded projects including reports incorporating:

- 1. The project name
- 2. Identification number
- 3. Project expenditure category
- 4. Description
- 5. Status of completion

WHEREAS, the Commissioners recognize the importance of public input, transparency, and accountability by engaging constituents and communities in developing plans implementing the use of the Fiscal Recovery Funds ("FRF") as stated in the IFR, and

WHEREAS, the State Examiner issued Directive 2021-1 stating that sufficient internal controls over all transactions must be in place including separate funds, maintaining records, detailed comments that provide audit trails, and appropriation by the fiscal body.

NOW, THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED by the Fulton County Board of Commissioners shall designate SLFRF funds pursuant to Title VI Coronavirus Relief, Fiscal Recovery and Critical Capital Projects Funds: Section 603(c)(1)(A) of the Social Security to local private entities for the support of projects through forgivable loans to be issued for one of the following expenditure categories:

The operation table and a new cooler have been received at the new forensic center. She has received 3 mini grants and one reimbursable grant this year. She did not receive an IPEP grant she applied for.

Bryan would like to define the focus of FEDCO for an incoming Director 9 to explore once the position is filled. There is an intern at the hospital covering the resignation of the hospital director that has opened good communication.

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
